

## **Media Summary**

The 3<sup>rd</sup> Biennial Seed potato conference was held at the Maryslands Country House in Marysville, Victoria over the 21st to the 22nd of July 2008. The conference attracted 180 registrants, significantly more than anticipated. The theme of the conference was "Your Industry Your Business Your Event", the purpose of which was to inform and update the industry the advances in new technology, outcomes of research and development, know-how and industry trends. The agenda of the conference addressed future challenges faced by the industry. The conference theme was achieved through presentations by international and national experts. Generous sponsorship facilitated the running of the conference and support of speakers. International delegates at the conference (notably John Sarup, Dr Jon Pickup and Dr Vivian Blok) were involved in post conference activities, including a PCN meeting involving regulators, scientists and growers.

Horticulture Australia sponsorship specifically supported Mr John Sarup from the Scottish Agricultural College who presented a keynote address at this conference. Mr Sarup also visited key growing regions within Victoria.

Additional goals were achieved at the seed potato conference. They included

- 1. A celebration of the International Year Of The Potato
- 2. A celebration of 70 years of certified seed production. ViCSPA members and buyers to recognised the contribution of certified seed potatoes to the Australian potato industry.
- 3. An opportunity to recognize industry leadership and succession Industry awards were given to individual who had made significant contributions to the industry.
- 4. The conference was an opportunity to get industry members together to
  - a. Develop pride in their industry
  - b. Develop their networks to assist their businesses
  - c. Provide a range of information to assist their businesses

## **Key Outcomes of the Conference**

A total of 180 delegates (including sponsors) were registered for the conference. Of the total registrations, 133 were industry participants and 47 were sponsors and their representatives. 192 delegates attended the conference dinner.

The relatively high number of delegates was a highlight, suggesting that the conference program had the right topics and the venue/location was ideal.

The Conference Handbook included abstracts of oral papers (provided as hard copy).

Horticulture Australia sponsorship specifically supported Mr John Sarup of the Scottish Agricultural College (SAC) where he is a John Sarup a potato agronomist from the Scottish Agricultural College. John works closely with growers in Scotland where his skills are in strong demand. At the conference, John discussed ways of improving potato crop uniformity to maximise crop performance and profits. With costs of inputs (seed, fertilizer, fuel, water) continuing to rise, it is increasing important that the potato crop is managed to obtain the greatest return with minimal wastage.

Other international speakers at the conference.

Dr Jon Pickup from The Scottish Agriculture Science Agency who has been involved in the development and implementation of new EU policy directives for PCN. Most significantly, the new Directive addresses the spread of PCN with all potatoes for planting, not just seed potatoes that are marketed. It also sets out a harmonised methodology for soil sampling, incorporating flexibility to accommodate the variation in the incidence of PCN and field sizes that occur across the EU. The Australian potato industry is developing a national strategy to harmonise the containment and testing standards for PCN across state boundaries. Jon's presentation is an excellent opportunity to see how the UK has handled PCN and continues to secure its world leading potato production.

Dr Pickup also spoke on potato viruses and aphid management

Vivian Blok is a research scientist form the Scottish Crop Research Institute who is a nematologist. Dr Blok shared her experiences with PCN and provided an insight into the technology for PCN that is being developed in the UK.

#### Results from the survey




Figure 1 Overall satisfaction of the conference

There was a large percentage of the respondents who were "very satisfied" with the conference overall (Figure 1). There were no responses that were "somewhat dissatisfied" or "very dissatisfied."




Figure 2 What was most valuable about the conference?

Most respondents noted the opportunity for networking as a valuable part of the conference, followed by the succession farm planning, farmers health, PCN, the general quality of the presentations and crop uniformity (Figure 2). While just under half of the responses reported that there were no *least valuable* parts of the conference, there was a high proportion of respondents who found PCN to be the least valuable session. This was followed by too much science in presentations. Many responses included both PCN commented on too much science. This could be attributed to the

- some presentations on PCN did have technical detail,
- there was a large number of presentations on PCN (the organising committee took advantage of the visiting scientists from the International Nematology conference that was held the week prior in Brisbane).
- PCN is a topic that not everyone needs to know but does not want to know.

Strategies were used to reduce technical jargon and avoiding too much science stuff, such as 2 min introductions by the presenter to deliver take home messages before their full presentations and keeping participation activities between speakers e.g. throwing beach ball over audience.

Most respondents rates the conference venue highly and also viewed the conference as an opportunity for information exchange (Figure 4).

### Overall satisfaction of the conference as a percentage of response ( n= 60)

## What was most valuable about the conference? (n=57)

## What was least valuable about the conference? (n=57)





Figure 3 What was least valuable about the conference?
