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General project overview

The Annual Vegetable Industry Seminar 2019 (AVIS) provided funding for 250 vegetable growers from horticultural regions across Australia to attend the seminar. A contingent of eight international (one team of two) and local research specialists delivered presentations at the seminar covering a range of topics that aligned directly with the Vegetable Strategic Investment Plan. The content flexibility of this project ensured that topical issues were discussed that will have immediate and ongoing benefit for growers. The seminar also highlighted new opportunities for industry R&D investment and export opportunities, and facilitated closer networking between the research community and Australian vegetable growers.

Summary

VG18001 – *Annual Vegetable Industry Seminar 2019* commenced in September 2018, and was comprised of a 4-hour seminar on 24 June, taking place during the Hort Connections 2019 convention held at the Melbourne Convention & Exhibition Centre.

The project focused on developing and running an outcome-oriented seminar of high value to the vegetable industry designed to increase the understanding of 250 levy-paying vegetable growers regarding innovations in agriculture that are research, technology or export based, and are currently in the development process.

After completion of the seminar, the feedback from the Australian vegetable growers who attended was highly positive. This confirmed a need for there to be a consistent knowledge stream regarding increased vegetable production and export potential in future years.

The AVIS added the latest instalment to a series of highly successful seminars held in previous years – namely, the 2016-2018 Global Innovations in Horticulture Seminars, and Export Opportunities for Carrots, Sweet Corn, Bean, Broccoli and Baby Leaf – Symposia's. The project brought together an assembly of key presenters to the Australian horticulture industry to introduce new information that can help grower invitees – and the broader industry – increase the profitability, efficiency and productivity of Australian horticultural farming operations. The seminar venue, speaker and participant invite list were developed by AUSVEG as well as the process of confirming attendees and speakers.

The AVIS aimed to share knowledge and up-to-date information that could help the Australian horticulture industry better understand and overcome current and future challenges to productivity, as well as promote dialogue between researchers and growers. The seminar drew attention to new concepts for R&D levy investment, and demonstrated the importance of collaboration between vegetable producers, global researchers, and key industry stakeholders. The substantial grower participation demonstrated an industry-wide commitment to increasing productivity. The seminar also aimed to provide value to growers through a series of educational sessions, to improve various elements of their businesses.

The project provided funding for 250 vegetable growers from horticultural regions across Australia to attend the seminar. A contingent of seven international and/or local research specialists developed presentations for the seminar, covering a range of topics that aligned directly with the *Vegetable Strategic Investment Plan*, as disseminated below in the following table.

The content flexibility of the project ensured that topical issues were discussed that will have immediate and ongoing benefit for growers. The seminar also highlighted new opportunities for industry R&D investment as well as export opportunities, and facilitated closer networking between the research community and Australian vegetable growers.

Each presenter at the seminar presented for 30 minutes, allowing enough time to discuss each topic in adequate detail. Time was also provided for facilitated Q&A sessions at the end of each presentation, to allow growers the opportunity to apply their own situations to the learnings. This was coupled with ample time for networking before and after the session to further develop discussions.

The Hort Connections event where the seminar was held in 2019, is the pre-eminent industry educational commercial networking event also run by AUSVEG. Hort Connections has an annual attendance of 3500 delegates, of which 25% are growers.

The purpose of this Milestone is to provide Hort Innovation Pty Ltd with a final report on outcomes from the 2019 seminar, as well as provide justification for future annual AUSVEG run seminars at the Hort Connections event.




The objectives of this project were achieved by providing Australian vegetable levy payers with direct access to, and engagement with, a range of leading international and local experts, with various specific areas of knowledge relating to horticulture.

A key outcome of this project for industry was to provide a heightened awareness and understanding of ways to increase farm productivity, increase post-farmgate integration, and improve the overall industry capability for adoption, innovation and export capability.

By offering participation in the seminar to a broad range of levy payers, AUSVEG is seeking to ensure that a greater number of vegetable growers are able to learn about new developments applicable to their business. As an industry, there is a recognised need for a forum for vegetable growers to learn about the latest technologies, export opportunities, production practices and insights in the local and international horticulture industry that can be adopted on- or off-farm to increase productivity and profitability, therefore our recommendation is that this seminar continues in future years.

The following survey results were obtained from hardcopy onsite surveys at the AVIS 2019. All survey results were successful, with one key highlight being all survey participants responding 'yes' to a question querying whether they wished to attend another Annual Vegetable Industry Seminar.











Figure 2: Audience members taking notes during the AVIS 2019.







Figure 4: Growers asking questions of presenters during the AVIS 2019.







Figure 6: Thomas King answering grower queries post-event.



Thomas King

One speaker who will inspire delegates is Thomas King, a social entrepreneur and international speaker who was named Young Australian of the Year (Victoria) in 2015. At age 13, Thomas founded the world's highest viewed website on unsustainable palm oil production. He has since represented Australia in a climate change film for IMAX in the Arctic, helped direct a campaign that raised \$1.6 million to alleviate poverty in Cambodia, and led other environmental, animal protection and global development projects across five continents.

After realising the major contribution of industrial animal agriculture across these fields, Thomas founded Food Frontier to grow the ecosystem for healthier and more humane and sustainable protein innovations across the Asia Pacific, including plant-based and clean meat.



Roger Tripathi

Joining Thomas is Roger Tripathi, a global business leader with a broadbased multinational and multicultural background who has worked and lived on most continents.

Roger is a results-driven leader with more than 36 years of global business experience in the agriculture industry. He started as a plant breeder and later became a business turnaround specialist in various segments including fertiliser, seeds, ag-chem and bio-agriculture.

Roger's passion for bio-agriculture will be evident at AVIS; he truly believes that if all R&D and commercial companies focus on 'grower to consumer' and 'soil to shelf' with farmers' return on investment in mind, the industry can achieve true sustainability.



Casper van Kempen

Another AVIS speaker is Casper van Kempen from The Netherlands. Casper spent 17 years on international assignments, working in Switzerland, France, the United States, West Africa and the Caribbean. He also held several international senior sales and marketing management positions in flower and vegetable seed companies.

Casper had his first exposure to piracy and counterfeit products when directing a pharmaceutical wholesale company in West Africa. From 2006-10, he coordinated the annual anti-piracy campaign in flowers for Fleuroselect (flower breeders) in western Europe.

In 2010 he took up his present position, starting the Anti-Infringement Bureau (AIB) for Intellectual Property (IP) Rights on Plant Material in Brussels, with 15 vegetable seed companies as members. At the 2016 Interpol IP Crime Conference in London, AIB received the Award for Outstanding Public and Private Partnership in the Fight against Intellectual Property Piracy.

Valuable perspectives

Thomas, Roger and Casper represent the breadth of topics that will be discusse at AVIS, which was built on the popularity of the Vegetable Industry Export ieminar and Global Innovations in Horticulture Servinar from previous years. Hort Innovation

VEGETABLE FUND

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Australian vegetable growers were treated to presentations from eight researchers and experts from around the world at the Annual Vegetable Industry Seminar, combining the Global Innovation in Horticulture and Export Seminars from previous years.

A packed room of 250 vegetable growers converged on the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre to learn from the industry's leading thinkers and network with their fellow peers. The seminar's core aim was to share knowledge and up-to-date information that could help the Australian horticulture industry better understand and overcome current and future challenges to productivity.

The new, larger event format meant that all growers interested in learning the latest scientific, technological and export-related content relevant to their businesses could do so. The Seminar's topics covered a range of areas, including blockchain and vertical integration, controlled and sustainable growing environments, vegetable seed infringement and even the future of plant-based meats and what that means for Australian agriculture.

The Annual Vegetable Industry Seminar (VG18001) is coordinated by AUSVEG and was a strategic levy investment under the Hort Innovation Vegetable Fund.

Blockchain and vertical integration

The Seminar was moderated by Greg Fraser, Chief Executive Officer of Plant Health Australia, who facilitated Q&A sessions with each speaker following their presentation. The first presentations for the Seminar were from Bryn McFadden and Harrison Enright of iTradeNetwork, a global provider of supply chain management solutions for the food and beverage industry based in California. They discussed the complexities of capturing data for food and beverage blockchains, promoting innovation in the perishables supply-chain and educating participants on how to adopt technology to solve real problems

Dennis Lin from BDO Australia addressed vertical integration for branded food businesses. Dennis, using his expertise in the field, discussed the benefits that food businesses could gain from vertically integrating their operations and the ideal scenarios when you would choose to (or not to) vertically integrate your business, as well as ways to understand the market when you have made the decision to adopt vertical integration.

Technology and the future of food production

The next speaker who addressed the vegetable growers in attendance was Marcus Van Heijst from technology company Priva, which develops hardware for climate control, energy saving and optimal reuse of water for horticulture. Marcus discussed controlled growing environments and how they are being used to transform food production in the fresh produce industry.

Attendees then heard from Thomas King, CEO of Food Frontier, a not-forprofit think tank and industry accelerator creating the ecosystem for a more healthy and sustainable food future, particularly through plant-based and cell-based meat. Thomas focused on the opportunities that could exist with the increasing popularity of plant-based meats and how vegetable growers could benefit. Thomas explained that as a food source, plant-based meats are becoming increasing popular among consumers who have concerns about the ethics and environmental impact of the agriculture industry.


Food for thought

Roger Tripathi, CEO of Global BioAg Linkages, presented on bio-agriculture's role in sustainable food and fibre production. Roger's core focus was how farmers could make a return on their investment by incorporating bioagricultural farming practices and their role in establishing 'grower to consumer' and 'soil to shelf' connections through the supply chain.

2018 Young Grower of the Year Chris McLoughlin from Escavox and Mycelia Organics addressed attendees on ways that innovation in production and supply-chain can be used to capture market share.

The final presentation for the day was from Casper Van Kempen from the Anti-Infringement Bureau for Intellectual Property Rights on Plant Material (AIB) in Belgium, who discussed why vegetable seeds are protected by Intellectual Property Rights, and why this is important for sustainable horticulture. Casper covered a number of important aspects to this complex topic, including the AIB's role, an overview of Plant Breeders' Rights, the main piracy issues and consequences with vegetable seeds and examples of successful initiatives from chain partners to combat piracy.
